A lot of my focus was on analysing data and reporting on students' attendance across Aotearoa. I am so glad I was immersed in this space as I have more of an understanding on the challenges students come across in Aotearoa. This has reshaped my thinking as I have grown an appreciation for the different journey's life brings. I was blessed to have a great manager with amazing connections, in which enabled me to shadow other teams that I had interest in. Through this I had a taste of the operations behind Learning Support Study Awards and Scholarships, and IT management.

I studied a Bachelor of Arts, double majoring in Human Geographies and Psychology.

I interned in the business group Te Pae Aronui, in the recently disestablished Parent, Information, and Community Integration Team, under Programme Delivery. The most valuable thing I learnt as my time as an intern was seeing Pasifika excellence in practice, my team delivered a ton of programmes geared towards supporting our Pacific learners and their parents, implementing an As and By Pacific approach to education, that focussed on the learner, and that they exist outside of education spaces, and how we breakdown those siloed barriers. These experiences have shaped how I see Pacific education and the future of it, that our practices and knowledges do hold value, but the biggest learning for me, was witnessing how these are practically implemented and how the community responds when they actively included in decision-making which highly benefits all parties involved.

A highlight of my upbringing was seeing my mother as a social worker, seeing her passion for helping young Pacific kids in difficult situations was endearing, but also hard seeing the struggles she had to deal with, but made me realise how important and necessary it is to support and nurture our kids and their futures, which is why I aspired to work in the community, especially in the spaces of human geographies and psychology.
